Message from Archbishop Michael Mulhall to the Members of the Catholic Women's League of the Archdiocese of Kingston April 2023

Dear Catholic Women's League Members:

I am pleased to offer greetings and best wishes on the occasion of your annual convention which is being held on the last weekend of April. I look forward to welcoming you to the Cathedral on Sunday, April 30th, to celebrate the Sunday Eucharist.

The 2023 convention theme - **Let's Reconnect** - is a wonderful opportunity for you to re-examine your relationships and commitments with each other, particularly with Our Lord Jesus Christ. Nurturing and strengthening your devotion to Our Lord through service and fellowship at this conference and in your parish communities enable the ongoing building of God's Kingdom in our midst. With the hectic pace of daily life, it is important to be intentional about your choice to follow Our Lord's example of service to our brothers and sisters. A good remedy is to begin each task by dedicating every effort to the Lord.

Annual Report 2022 - Message to all attendees of the 2023 Convention

My dear sisters in the League, welcome to the 2023 Diocesan Convention of the Catholic Women's League! 2022 has been a year in which many of our local parish councils of the Catholic Women's League began to meet again in-person as we began a clear and progressive post-pandemic way of living. I became the spiritual advisor to the Diocesan Executive in May, and it has been a real joy to attend the Provincial Convention in Ottawa in July, to lead a retreat for the executive in August, to attend one of the regional Development Day in November, to see our local parish council presidents and their guests at the two Presidents' meetings (October 2022 and February 2023), as well as to lead the March 2023 retreat at St. Patrick in Railton.

Locally, and across the archdiocese of Kingston, we have felt the joy of reconnecting with each other at the same time and in the same place, leaving behind the sense of isolation which came with our understandable concern for safety throughout the pandemic. As you read this annual report, let us praise God for all that He has done to bring us back in-person to this convention floor for the second year in a row!

We celebrate those of you who decided to step into leadership within the executive of your newly-elected local council, and those who kept your council alive through the pandemic and beyond. We offer our helping hands to those who wish to begin rebuilding the League wherever they are.

We are not blind to the struggles faced across the archdiocese, not numb to the weariness some feel in their bones, not indifferent to the disappointments some of you have experienced throughout the pandemic, and coming out of it. But we do not grieve as those who have no hope (1 Th 4:13). Instead, we believe that even death itself does not have the last word, thanks to Jesus Christ, risen from the dead.

We mourned those sisters whose participation we have lost on earth upon their death, as they became feeble, as they lost their memory, and/or as they moved to a nursing home, but we also celebrate the courage of our vulnerability which leans not on our own efforts, but on the Power of God who breathes new life into the dry bones of our incomplete results. We believe in the Communion of Saints. We believe that our sisters of decades past intercede for us from Heaven, and pray for the Eternal rest and happiness of our sisters in need of purification on their way to Eternal happiness.

We come together at this convention as the apostles along with some of the women disciples (Acts 1:14) came together to prepare for the coming of the Holy Spirit. We beg the Consoler sent by Jesus to kindle in our hearts during these blessed days a new missionary fire, an enthusiasm, and an overflowing joy which will lead us to build personal relationships within our parishes with the young single and married women, as well as the new mothers who are stepping into our local church communities looking for faith, service, and social justice. Sisters, the future is bright, since the darkness cannot overcome Jesus (Jn 1:5)!

In March, we held our Winter President's meeting in person at our Spiritual Advisor Fr. Dale Wright's home parish. We were able to safely distance in the church. We began the half-day session celebrating Mass and conducted necessary business with over 30 in attendance. On April 30, we welcomed 134 delegates to our '100th Diocesan Convention'. The 2 day affair was held at a new venue this year: Quality Inn and Conference Centre in Kingston. For the 1st time, we offered live streaming of the entire event for those wanting to join us from home. Our keynote speaker was Robert Mundle, a certified spiritual health practitioner, who spoke to us on Loneliness. Nancy Stevens, Founder of Kenya Help, was able to join us and provided an update on her great works. A spontaneous collection brought in over \$1,000 for that organization. A History Book, for years 2012 to 2021, was created and offered to councils and members for \$10. A Collection of Prayers booklet containing favourite prayers and spiritual quotes from our members and spiritual advisors was assembled and gifted to all members. Diocesan Election was conducted at the conclusion of our convention. Many positions were left vacant but the core team was created. Archbishop Mulhall also appointed a new Diocesan Spiritual Advisor for the next term, Fr. Stéphane Pouliot.

In May, we conducted a 'Transition' meeting for outgoing and new executive to handoff their portfolios. Our newly appointed Life Member Liaison, Stephanie Spinelli, provided the new officers with overall training and expectations. I introduced my theme for my term as 'Let's Reconnect'.

In July, 13 delegates from the Kingston Diocese attended Provincial Convention in Ottawa, including our newly appointed Spiritual Advisor.

In August, all officers attended an Officer's Retreat and planning session in Kingston Mills. Our morning was led by Fr. Stéphane Pouliot with a spiritual reflection and ending with Mass. After a potluck lunch, we spent the afternoon planning the year ahead.

Our Fall President's meeting was held in October at St. Paul the Apostle Parish hall with over 40 people in attendance. Along with necessary business, we reviewed portions of National's resource: 'Eliminating Misconceptions About the League'.

Finally in November, we offered a Development Half Day presentation called 'Reconnect: Where Do We Go from Here?' It was held at 4 locations across the diocese simultaneously and in person. Suggestions and ideas on how to grow parish councils and expand the leadership pool were well received.

Parish councils donated a total of \$61,880.00 to all charities in 2022.

Were there frequently asked questions (FAQs) on the duties of Treasurer not answered by policy or guidelines? Describe these FAQs and how you answered or assisted with obtaining an answer.

- Frequently, I was asked for clearer directions as to the category that the respondent should input their donation. I would assist them in completing the form.
- Only 1 council submitted under the new committees: Faith, Service and Social Justice

In point form below, describe any unusual activities undertaken as Treasurer at the parish or diocesan level in 2022.

- Because it was the Diocesan's 100th anniversary we asked each Council to hold a special donation to assist the war in the Ukraine – in particular a Polish priest in a diocese near the Polish/Ukrainian border – we asked only for 100 dollars hoping to receive \$4,100. Instead we raised \$7,337.00
- In preparation for our 101st convention the Diocesan Council undertook hosting the convention, asking for individual councils to take on a role such as hospitality, registration etc. We obtained a lottery license. We are able to hold our annual retreat and I was asked to set up Auto deposit at the bank – in hopes that we could hold a virtual silent auction to assist us in raising funds for the convention.

List any recommendations for improvements in policy, guidelines, or reporting related to the Treasurer position including identifying at what level of the League.

- We are still dealing with councils who are not familiar with programs that can convert PDF documents to Word to complete forms. It also becomes an added expense for a treasurer to install Adobe plus. Google documents does not always convert easily either.
- Most of the directives in 2022 were on the per capita fee increase. So this added another burden on councils to raise funds, raise their membership fee and so on.
- I could see holding workshops on how to complete the forms.

Recording Secretary Report

- The majority of councils send the Minutes (and the Annual Report) to members by email or post or in person at Masses. These can be reviewed, amended and approved at the next meeting. One Council posts Agendas and Minutes on their bulletin board.
- One Council developed an information package about the League, what the Council does locally and a list of current executive members with their phone numbers.
- At meetings and through emails, members are encouraged to access Diocesan, Provincial and National websites to see what's going on and to utilize resources there. The League magazine is often referenced at meetings.
- Eight of the 29 Councils have their own newsletter

- In winter magazine 2022, an article that was liked was The Role of Women in the Church.
- Need more articles on local parish councils.

Media: for Evangelization

- Promoting faith-oriented programs such as National Day for Truth and Reconciliation; world communications day; The Catholic Register; Mass for Shut-ins plus Salt and Light daily mass.
- Shared League Mass on April 26 in honour of "The Feast of Our Lady of Good Council".

Media: to Promote the League

- About 50% of council's have encouraged members to visit the CWL on Facebook or Twitter. 88% of council's have encouraged members to use cwl.ca. Most councils use church bulletin inserts or bulletin boards at church.

Media: Evaluation and Promotion of Good Content

- It has been a difficult year and less than 10% of councils have encouraged members to monitor media content.

Media: Newsletter and Bulletins

- Have used local media and parish websites for submitting material for publication or sent thank you after events or invitation to attend events
- Organized telephone calls to members or by email

Pornography

- The diocesan council has found due to covid there was no distribution of Pornography Hurts, they have not promoted the Over 18 documentary, or film Red Light Green light. Some have encouraged members to become more involved. 25% of council's have encouraged members to educate themselves and their families on safe, wise and responsible Internet use.
- 42% of council's have shared with their members the strategic planning information 25% recite the Renewal Prayer found on the National website.

For each of the following, describe ways parish councils and diocesan council assisted members in their communal and personal prayer life in 2022?

- Most councils reported using a variety of prayer styles
- Half of those responding suggested they used spiritual readings and perhaps a book club.
- Some attended retreats or days of reflection or webinars.
- A few reported using resources from the national website. These resources are much appreciated.

In their growth in Catholic faith?

- Most councils reported sharing information from Catholic sources.
- Some councils reported using programs from online sites.
- A few reported using information and programs derived from courses, workshops or guest speakers.
- Only a few chairs report that they used Vatican II documents to study

In being up to date on the role of women in the church?

- Most councils reported keeping up to date on the role of women through their own discussion, reading and research.
- A few suggested they read or studied documents on women in the church coming from the Vatican and/or the CCCB.
- One reported they had a guest speaker on the topic of women in the church.

Describe ways parish and diocesan councils supported women/men discerning their vocation?

- One council described having a prayer for discernment and a process that helped them be open to the Spirit. They looked at "head work and heart work"
- Councils are involved in preparing children for the sacraments and in doing so, are introduced to the idea of God's hopes for them.
- RCIA candidates are being prayed for by many councils.
- Councils offer financial support to seminarians through our provincial voluntary fund. They will also financially support anyone from their parish discerning their religious vocation.
- Support is shown by many councils to archdiocesan initiatives of prayer and financial aid to our seminarians.
- Vocation cross prayers are also used in some councils.
- Council members attend ordinations and liturgies of persons taking religious vows.
- Anyone discerning a religious vocation is encouraged by parish council members to take on leadership roles in liturgy and parish events.
- Suggested they have used pamphlets and bulletin announcements to promote discernment.

Describe any unusual activities undertaken as Spiritual Development at the parish or diocesan level in 2022.

- Councils are recovering from Covid years and are hoping for a more normal year in 2023 in which they can focus more on the spiritual growth of our members and continue their faith journey 'face to face' once again.

List any recommendations for improvements in policy, guidelines, or reporting related to the Spiritual Development position including identifying at what level of the League.

- The resources on the national website are being used and appreciated by some. Gradually more councils will access these resources.
- A couple of councils expressed their thoughts that the questions asked in the Spiritual Development section, did not give them the opportunity to express some of what they were doing as a council. Eg. Supporting sacramental preparation, youth initiatives, support for parish initiatives, ministries

For each of the following, describe ways parish councils and diocesan council supported recruitment and retention of members:

Annual Membership Drive

- Membership drives occur annually in all parish councils that reported.
- The drive usually happens between November and January
- Councils do their best to reach all women in their parishes. They advertise in bulletins, with posters and from the pulpit. Ladies acknowledge that the personal invitation is still most important, so lots of phone calls and personal invites to meetings and visits are part of the process.
- Many promote their membership at special occasions: coffee Sundays, celebrations of pin presentations, celebratory luncheons etc.
- Membership envelopes are part of the Sunday envelope package in many parishes.

Info sessions for members.

- Some councils prepare and send out welcome letters to new members, some make phone calls to new members. This provides an opportunity to put forth our mission statement and some of the activities of the council.
- When presidents receive information, it is passed on to executive members.
- Advent and Lenten mini retreats are held in some councils. It is usually open to the parish.
- A council reports they have developed an information package for their new members including a list of the current executive and their contact numbers, also outlining their council's activities.
- Members are encouraged to peruse diocesan, provincial and national websites and to read the national magazine. Many League members appreciate the magazine and use it to keep informed.
- Members have spoken at Masses and councils have helped subsidize membership where needed.
- Many councils attended our diocesan development day.
- On Specific Sundays, executive members are at the back of the church before and after masses to answer questions in one parish.
- Councils sometimes are able to keep a poster board available and up to date with current news.
- Most councils are using email extensively to forward information. Some councils have websites and their own newsletters.
- There are also a few councils who have found membership and distributing information to members a real challenge.

Info session for prospective members?

- Recruitment is most often the result of personal invitation.
- Members are sometimes encouraged to bring a non-member to a meeting or event (potluck, or social)
- One council said, "we rely on our reputation to bring in members and it works". As I outlined in a directive, if we display joy and commitment, sometimes others want what we have!
- Displaying information and newsletters.
- One council is hoping for a package on recruitment methods and perhaps ideas on retaining members.

What resources/assistance would parish councils like to have?

- Ladies are using websites and the national magazine. These are tools that reach many members so it is important to keep them accessible and current.

- Councils appreciate brochures about the League.
- Councils are being encouraged to look on the national, provincial and diocesan websites frequently to find what the need: prayers, reflections, liturgies, information.
- Members have reported that they have appreciated the availability of the diocesan president.
- League Development and new positions were topics mentioned.
- It is also suggested that assistance is needed in guiding members through the various websites.
- Diocesan initiated sessions on recruitment, new positions and League Development would be useful.
- Members suggested they need help recruiting younger women. Also resources on describing and promoting the different types of membership would be useful.
- It is suggested that training sessions for executive members would be useful in late summer, early fall.
- A workshop on moving forward post covid might be useful.

Were there frequently asked questions (FAQs) on the duties of President-Elect/ Organization? Describe the FAQs and how you answered or assisted with obtaining an answer.

- Many councils do not have a president-elect/ vice president. This is certainly a problem as a new president does not have the usual experience gained in the role. Diocesan executives are trying to be very approachable in mentoring and advising. The diocesan president and members of diocesan executive have attended parish council meetings on occasion or have met individually with members.
- Questions have come to us pertaining to membership and we are usually able to search out answers for them.
- There were also questions surrounding the instructed voting which has taken place in 2022. We were able to help and answer questions.

List any recommendations for improvements in policy, guidelines, or reporting related to President-Elect/Organization position including identifying at what level of the League.

- We have received two new members through the national website. This process is good.
- I think communication between organization chairs at various levels is important. It keeps us focused and provides opportunity to discuss small issues that might otherwise go unaddressed.

Life Membership

- Some councils have life members living in their area and find them a great benefit to their council.
- Life members are a wealth of knowledge and assist in reports and election protocol.
- Life members act as mentors and are always willing to help and facilitate workshops.

Additional

- During covid councils kept lines of communication open via emails and phone calls.
- There were opportunities for communal prayer.
- One council was able to provide an outdoor honor guard for a deceased member of 62 years at her funeral.
- Lines of communication were kept open with phone calls and emails and posts in the online church bulletin as well as masked meetings and zoom meetings.
- Some councils continued to support their regular charities.
- Due to covid, activities in the parishes were still limited in 2022 with most councils not meeting in person.
- The most necessary business was conducted by the executive.
- Usually, a large number of members participated in fundraisers while fewer attended meetings.

For each of the following, list actions by parish councils and diocesan council to:

Support marriage and families.

- Many councils provide meaningful gifts to newly married couples such as bibles, crucifixes, and masses.
- Councils help with preparation for sacraments and provide gifts to children being baptized and for First Communion and Confirmation as well as celebrations following sacraments.
- Coordinate school Masses and host monthly family Mass, and family potluck dinners.
- Recognition for significant wedding anniversaries.
- At Christmas, provide baskets and gifts for needy families, donate to food banks, and school food programs.
- Some members have participated as counsellors at Marriage Preparation Course for the Parish.

Uphold or advocate for the sanctity of life.

- Councils make monetary donations to Birth Right, have held peaceful protests against abortion and attended Life Chain and March for Life.
- They held a Living Rosary around the perimeter of the church, and hold monthly Mass for Sanctity of Life.
- Many Councils utilized post cards in the church pews to encourage parishioners to write their Member of Parliament regarding Abortion and Euthanasia issues.
- Many Councils supported, hosted, participated in Twelve Hours of Prayer for Palliative Care.
- A section of the garden at a Parish is devoted to Sanctity of Life, they held rededication of their statue for the "unborn".

Support youth.

- Councils support bursaries for graduating grade 8 and 12 students, financially support the "Squires Youth Group", supported young adult in Christian Catholic Outreach.

The League shall be composed of parish, diocesan, provincial councils and a national council with the following compositions:

1. **Parish Council:** shall be composed of the individual members.
2. **Diocesan Council:** shall be composed of its officers, presidents of parish councils in the diocese, parish delegates accredited to the diocesan convention, honorary life members and life members holding a membership in the diocese.
3. **Provincial Council:** shall be composed of its officers, presidents of diocesan councils in the province, diocesan and parish delegates accredited to the provincial convention, honorary life members and life members holding a membership in the diocese.
4. **National Council:** shall be composed of its officers, presidents of provincial councils, honorary life members, life members, and provincial and diocesan delegates accredited to the national convention

Objects

The objects of the League shall be to unite Catholic Women of Canada:

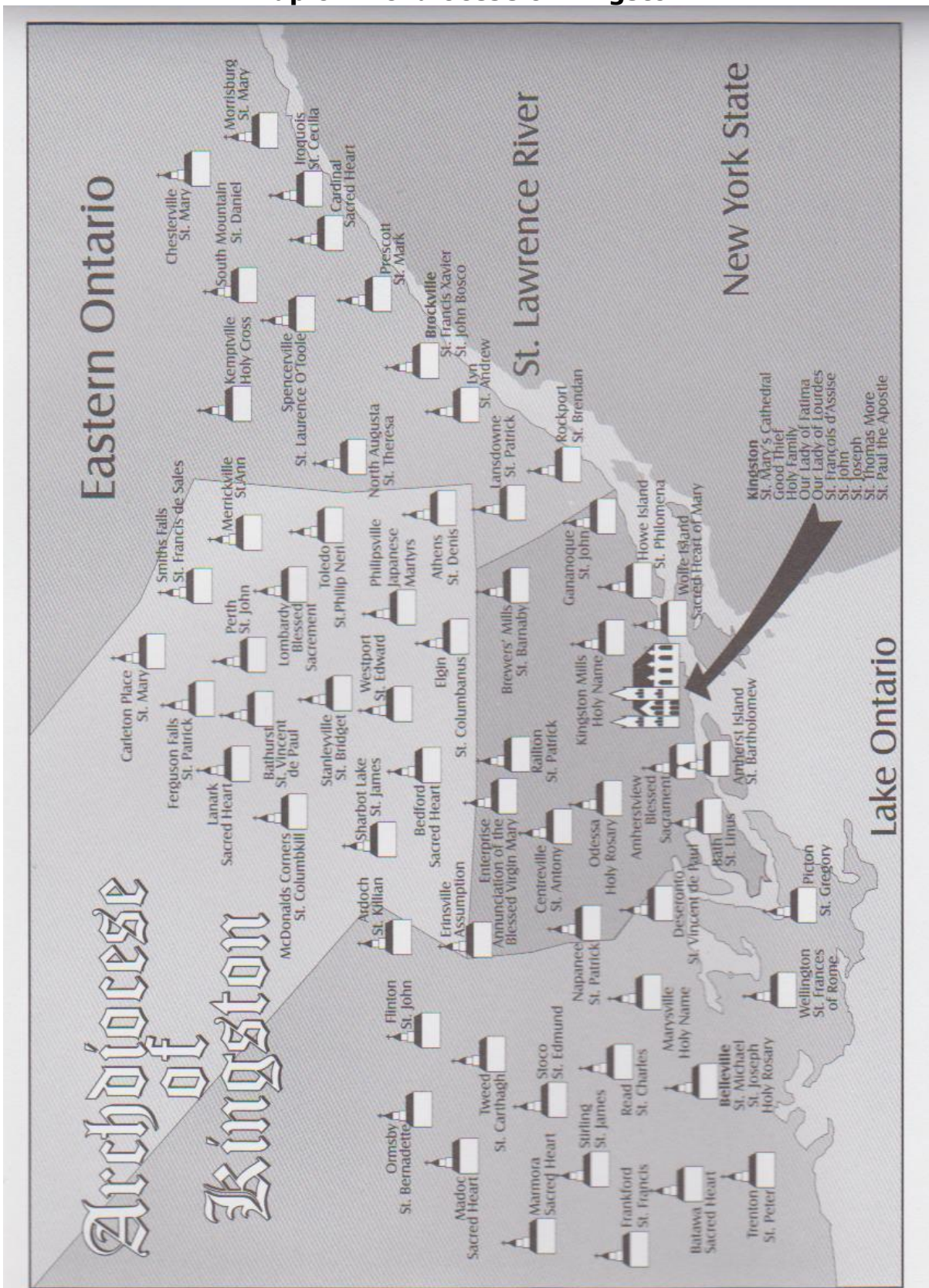
1. to achieve individual and collective spiritual development
2. to promote the teachings of the Catholic Church
3. to exemplify the Christian ideal in home and family life
4. to protect the sanctity of human life
5. to enhance the role of women in Church and society
6. to recognize the human dignity of all people everywhere
7. to uphold and defend Christian education and values in the modern
8. to contribute to the understanding and growth of religious freedom, social justice, peace and harmony

Policy

The policy of the League shall be:

1. to have membership and operation based on the parish unit, with diocesan, provincial and national representation levels
2. to operate on a system of standing committees and to make the fullest possible use of these committees in the involvement of all members
3. to develop leadership qualities and provide training to enable members to take active roles in the affairs of their faith, community and society
4. to maintain affiliation with the World Union of Catholic Women's Organizations
5. to cooperate at all levels with other organizations where and in whatever
6. manner the council concerned agrees is necessary or desirable to accomplish the objects of the League
7. to maintain liaison with pastoral councils in accordance with the Code of Canon Law politically non-partisan
